A tram was duly hired and at 9.15 a.m. on Thursday morning, April 30, the kindergarten children (with the exception of one small boy who refused to go and hid in the bushes, so was left behind with the house-keeper), clambered aboard.

They were accompanied by four of the kindergarten staff, Mrs. McEwen, Miss H. Malcouronne, Miss J. McKeown, and Mrs. D. Green and three mothers, Mrs. D. Hearfield, Mrs. M. Findlay and Mrs. J. Cook.

Instead of a tram ticket, the conductress gave each child a post-card of a tram with the history of the trams on the back.


DEMONSTRATION:

Statement On Nursery Is Challenged

E Post 25-4-67

A statement made yesterday by the secretary of the Wellington Free Kindergarten Association (Mrs P E Hampton) that no decision had been made regarding the closure of the Newtown nursery school was challenged today by the treasurer of the Newtown Free Kindergarten and Nursery School (Mr P Jacobs).

Mr Jacobs produced a letter which was sent to his wife who is secretary of the Newtown Free Kindergarten, by the Wellington Free Kindergarten Association and signed by Mrs Hampton.

The letter, dated July 11, stated that a full report on the extent and cost of repairs, re-fitting and equipping of the building used as a kindergar-ten and nursery school had been presented to the executive of the Wellington Free Kindergarten Association Council and discussed at a meeting held on

July 10.

According to the letter a motion was passed at the meeting "that, provided the necessary finance could be raised, the building be closed for a period for the repairs, refitting and equipping, and that it be reopened solely as a kindergarten."

The letter continued: "Until final arrangements regarding finance, and calling of tenders, etc, have been completed we cannot say when the building will be closed, but in the meantime we have instructed the director not to admit any more nursery school children to the roll."
